THE SONG OF CREATION

The Lord's Day, March 8, 2015 9:30 and 11:00 am Sanctuary Services

We gather for worship this day to magnify the glory of our Great Creator God. When I look at your heavens, the work of your fingers, the moon and the stars, which you have set in place, what is man that you are mindful of him, and the son of man that you care for him? O LORD, our Lord, how majestic is your name in all the earth! (Psalm 8:3-9 ESV)

As we come before you this **The Reflections for the Prelude**

God takes pleasure in his creation. Genesis 1 describes for us not only the fact of an ordered creation by God, but also God's response to his creation. Five times, you recall, God stands back, as it were, and takes stock of his creation. Each time the text says, "And God saw that it was good" (vv. 4, 12, 18, 21, 25). And when all was finished and man and woman were created in his own image, it says, "And God saw everything that he had made, and behold, it was very good." I take this to mean that God was delighted with his work. When he looked at it, it gave him pleasure. He was pleased and happy with his creative effort.

I have been picking up little things in Scripture that show God's intimate involvement in creation. For example, in 1 Corinthians 15:38 Paul is comparing how a seed is planted in one form and comes forth in another form with a "body" different from all other bodies. He says, "God gives it a body just as he wished, and to each of the seeds a body of its own." This is a remarkable statement of God's involvement in the way God designed each seed to bring forth its own unique plant (not just species but each individual seed!). Paul is not teaching about evolution here, but he is showing how he takes God's intimate involvement with creation for granted. He cannot imagine, evi dently, that any natural process should be conceived without God's doing it.

Again in Psalm 94:9 it says, "He who planted the ear, does he not hear? He who formed the eye, does he not see?" The psalmist assumes that God was the designer of the eye and that he designed the way the ear is planted in the head to do its hearing work. So when we marvel at the wonders of the human eye and the remarkable structure of the ear, we are not to marvel at the processes of chance but at the mind and the creativity of God.

Similarly in Psalm 95:5, "The sea is his for he made it; and his hands formed the dry land." The involvement of God in making land and sea is such that the present sea is his. It is not as though he in some impersonal way set it all in motion a billion years ago. Rather he is the one who owns it because he made it. It is today his handiwork and bears the marks of his creator claim on it, like a piece of artwork belongs to the one who painted it until he sells it or gives it away.

I point out these things to call you to be God-centered in your admiration of the wonders of the world. God decided what the Iris beside our fence should look like this week when it came to flower. God means for the beauty of that plant (not just that kind of plant)—that very plant to be an occasion for our worshipping his specific creativity.

The Gospel Story Song Cycle for the Psalm 33: 1-9 Easter Season

Our six corporate worship opportunities leading up to and including Easter Sunday, will center on, and progressively build upon, the story line of The Gospel.

Hymn of Providence This Is My Father's World

Creation and Providence

Once we understand that God is the all-powerful Creator, it seems reasonable to conclude that he also preserves and governs everything in the universe as well.

The term providence has been traditionally used to summarize God's ongoing relationship to his creation.

When we accept the biblical doctrine of providence, we avoid four common errors in thinkina about God's relationship to creation: The biblical doctrine is not deism (which teaches that God created the world and then essentially abandoned it), nor pantheism (which teaches that the creation does not have a real, distinct existence in itself. but is only part of God), but providence which teaches that though God is actively related to and involved in the creation at each moment. creation is distinct from him.

Moreover, the biblical doctrine does not teach that events in creation are determined by <u>chance</u> (or randomness), nor are they determined by <u>impersonal</u> <u>fate</u> (or determinism), but <u>by</u> <u>God</u>, who is the personal yet infinitely powerful Creator and Lord.

We may define God's providence as follows: God is continually involved with all created things in such a way that he (1) keeps them existing and maintaining the properties with which he created them; (2) cooperates with created things in every action, directing their distinctive properties to cause them to act as they do; and (3) directs them to fulfill his purposes.

Living Responsibly As We Enjoy the Good Gives of God

1 Timothy 6:13-19

As a steward, disciple of Christ, worshiper, we are to celebrate the goodness of life as we live with joyful responsibility.

I. We are to live responsibly.

If worship is reflecting back to God the radiance of his worth then we are to be swallowed up in the immensity, wonder, goodness, and nearness of the triune God – who richly provides us with everything for our enjoyment.

"I am to love God enough to be contented, because otherwise even our natural and proper desires bring us into revolt against God. God has made us with proper desires, but if there is not a proper contentment on my part, to this extent I am in revolt against God, and of course revolt is the central problem of sin. When I pack proper contentment, I have forgotten that God is God...A quiet disposition and a heart-giving thanks is the real test of the extent to which we love and trust God at the moment."

II. The pursuit of God and our joy are concurrent (simultaneously pursue).

"O God, you are my God; earnestly I seek you; my soul thirsts for you; my flesh faints for you, as in a dry and weary land where there is no water. ² So I have looked upon you in the sanctuary, beholding your power and glory. ³ Because your steadfast love is better than life, my lips will praise you. ⁴ So I will bless you as long as I live; in your name I will lift up my hands. ⁵ My soul will be satisfied as with fat and rich food, and my mouth will praise you with joyful lips, ⁶ when I remember you upon my bed, and meditate on you in the watches of the night; ⁷ for you have been my help, and in the shadow of your wings I will sing for joy. ⁸ My soul clings to you; your right hand upholds me." IV. We are to live for eternity and joyfully recognize that God's gifts given in "this present world" are not permanent.

V. Our ultimate confidence/hope is in the living God.

"Once we allow money to have lordship over our lives, it becomes Money with a capital M, a god that jealously dethrones all else. Money makes a terrible master, yet it makes a good servant to those who have the right master – God.

To regard money as evil, and therefore useless for purposes of righteousness, is foolish. To regard it as good and therefore overlook its potential for spiritual disaster is equally foolish. Use it, Jesus said, but don't serve it.

The goal, then, is not that money be put to death, but that it be trained and handled with discipline, as a lion we are seeking to tame. Money may be temporarily under our control, but we must always regard it as a wild beast, with power to turn on us if we drop our guard." Randy Alcorn, Money, Possessions, and Eternity, p. 19
